

Disciples Mission House Project

We are honored to have been invited to take part in a new initiative, from the National Office of the Disciples Church, entitled Disciples Mission House Project. Memphis was chosen as one of the cities in which it was felt would be suitable to start this project, and our Church was invited due to the involvement of Patti Case as one of the organizers. You may recall she wrote the initial report on our Church for the New Beginnings Program last year and was therefor acquainted with our facilities.

An initial meeting was hosted by us on May 28th and was attended by the scheme organizers and representatives from Lindenwood and Mississippi Boulevard, together with five members of our Church.

The scheme, still in the planning stages, is a proposal to launch up to five congregationally based sites in the Fall of 2014, designed, in their words, "To help Disciples Young Adults (21—30) explore mission/vocation in the context of intentional community, volunteer service and spiritual discernment."

Essentially a group of local Disciples Church will join to provide accommodation, spiritual guidance, mentoring support and other facilities for up to 4 young people for about a year, while they work in a charity or other similar non-profit organization. Some financial sponsorship will also be needed.

This is a very exciting initiative and we have expressed our willingness to continue to be a part of the project probably contributing at least meeting space, invitations to our Family Dinners, mentoring and spiritual guidance.

The Board will keep you informed as to further developments.

Spotlight on John Bennett

Each month I am trying to include an article about one of our congregation. In the absence of any other contribution, and in the hope of encouraging others, I am turning the spotlight on myself!

I was raised in Lewes a small market town in the County of East Sussex in England. Lewes was home to Thomas Paine, author of Common Sense (1776), the all-time best-selling American book that advocated colonial America's independence from the Kingdom of Great Britain. I was brought up in a Catholic family, the seventh of eight children, two boys and six girls. This accounts for my inferiority complex! My mother, Elizabeth, known to all as Nancy, was an author of religious and historical novels and died only a few years ago at 96. My father was also gifted being an accountant who came first in the country in his taxation exams.

I recall the austerity of 1950's England, the ration books and clothing coupons despite my parents being well off. In addition to the accounting practice my father also owned a newspaper and an interest in a glass making business. We had the first TV in town and I remember family and friends gathering around the flickering cathode ray tube to watch the Coronation in 1953. I went to Catholic boarding schools until the fifth grade when the family had a financial crash and we had to move out of our 36 room house in Lewes into a three bedroom house in Brighton and I completed my education in the state system.

I was not a good student, always being placed at the bottom of the class but must have pulled myself together as I received the equivalent of a high school diploma, issued by Oxford University, which refers to passes being achieved in English, English literature, history, mathematics and, believe it or not, religious knowledge. At that point I decided against going to University but took the entrance exams toward taking articles in my father's accounting practice. This led me to a career in Corporate Recovery initially with the British Government's Insolvency Service and later in private practice. By the 2001 I was the senior partner of one of the largest London firms dealing with distressed businesses. I was also divorced but had two lovely children. (continued inside back page)

In September 2001 I met Connie. She was stranded in London following the attack on the World Trade Center and she, with three other American tourists, was staying in a small London hotel. My new apartment was being redecorated so I was in the same hotel. At that time my hobby was producing London fringe theater (off Broadway to you), so I invited this group of refugees to come along to that night's production "Burn This". Connie I went out together the following evening and the rest, as they say, is history. We were married in Mountain View Arkansas in July 2002, this month being our 11th anniversary, and Connie and I made plans for her to move to England. Life was going quite nicely thank you. Give God a laugh and tell him your plans for the future.

In August 2002 my financial world collapsed and, at about the same time, Connie's mothers health deteriorated so that she was unable to look after herself. I therefor came to live in the U.S.A. and started a new life. I got work with PotteryBarn, later with the sister company Williams Sonoma, and have been there ever since mainly in sales though, more recently as a knife specialist, teaching use and safety of kitchen knives.

In 2007, I think it was, Connie and I came to this Church, on the Central Gardens Tour, where we were welcomed by Mark Rutledge and Debra Goodnight. Despite that we came back! We both feel that we have found our spiritual home and I am so grateful for the support of our Church family to this stranger on a foreign shore.
