Spotlight on Giving

This month we bring you two offertory thoughts. The first was given to us by Katrinka Hall on Sunday June 8th:

"Who Owns Your French Fries". It is the story of a man who buys his little boy some french fries. Then the father does what all fathers do, he reaches over and takes one french fry to taste it. The little boy slaps his father's hand and says, "Don't touch my french fries." The father thinks that his son is selfish. The father knows that he bought the french fries and they belong to him. The father knows that his son belongs to him. The father could get angry and never buy his son another french fry again to teach his son a lesson, or the father could "bury" his son in french fries. The father thinks, "Why is my son selfish, I have given him a whole package of french fries; I just want one french fry." Now this trip was usually not something for our benefit, although I do remember a clock we redeemed there that has long since disappeared. No, we made this trip to get gifts for teachers who had, as my dad said, 'Put up with' my brother and me that school year. I am sure there were things that my parents wanted or needed in the store, but they had to get the teachers something. Teachers were people my brother and I took for granted; these folks who taught us, praised us, scolded us, tattled on us... but my parents thought that it was an important gesture- a way to say thank you! That is what my offering is- a way to say, 'Thank you, Jesus for all you have done for me', and I also think, as my dad would say, for 'putting up with me!'".

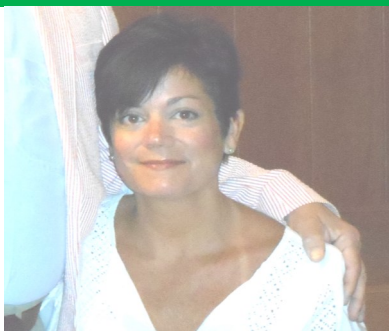

"Happy Father's Day. To all the men of our church, some are fathers, step-fathers or mentors. The Membership Committee is sending a gift to Dr. John Lang's Compassion Clinic in honor of the men of the Church. We feel this is appropriate as our men are compassionate people.

On Mother's Day we watched Allen Goodnight and Clay Artman serve their parents communion and we thought how proud they must be of them, as all of you are of your children. We listen as you mention what your children are doing and it is true someone has to lay the ground work.

We thought it would be interesting to honor our fathers, and men in our lives that taught and mentored us, to hear some of the lessons they taught you. Here are some of the fatherly quotes that were given by some of you:

'Hit it don't quit it.'

'It's not time to worry yet.'

'Work hard and you will keep warm.'

'Don't worry about it until it happens, then it is too late to worry about it.'

'Don't ever say anything you have to take back.'

'Always tell the truth, you don't have to remember what you said.'

'One of the things my father instilled in me was that all people, regardless of creed, color etc. are equal in god's sight and so they should be in our sight.'

'My grandfather's medical wisdom every-time I had a boo-boo. Don't cry—It will feel better when it stops hurting. Of course he was right every-time.'

'Sometimes you start down the road of life without a father. Then god blesses you with men who adopt you. I thank god for all the men of this church who adopted me.'

"When my brothers and I were children, our father sometimes had to work more than one job to make ends meet. One of his part-time jobs was the night engineer at a local radio station. Since no self-respecting West Texas Radio Station would ever play classical music, when the station received a classical record, my father would bring it home for us to play on his hand-made record player. By doing that he introduced classical music to a whole neighborhood of barefoot children. I especially recall one boy sitting cross-legged on the floor in front of our record player saying over and over 'it's beautiful, it's beautiful'. It was beautiful and I have loved classical music ever since."

"My Pops, as I call him, is my best friend. He spent 40 years at the same job providing for us, so now I try to let him have as much fun as I can. I actually have more fun watching him have fun than me having fun myself."
