Property and Grounds

The last few months have seen an ongoing problem with the gymnasium roof leaking, particularly as this water will, eventually, damage the basketball court floor. We have had the roof patched in the past but the reality is that it needs replacement. However the cost of a new roof is outside our reach at present so we have contracted a roofer to do further sealing and patching which, together with unplugging roof drains, may buy us a few more years. As you can see from the pictures the build up of water, after severe rain, not only encourages the leaks but places a great stain on the roof structure because of the weight of the visible water and the weight of the sodden insulation below. Hopefully we can achieve a long term solution before too long.

On the bright side we have received sufficient donations to enable us to commission the repair of the vandalized stained glass windows. The contractors, Laukoffs of Memphis, hope to complete this work during May.
