



Worth Repeating ~ Offertory Thoughts

People in the New Testament world were often sent to beg if they had some physical affliction, such as blindness. The Jews of

Kathy Young that time believed that the possible cause of such an affliction was unforgiven sin, either that of the afflicted person, or the parents of the afflicted person. Often when Jesus performed miracles of healing, they were accompanied by the forgiveness of sin. This action was probably more for the people watching than for the person being healed. Sometimes Jesus would remark that the person being healed had more faith than the watching audience.

Our society does not blatantly equate affliction with sin, but our society does sometimes shun and look down on people who have the misfortune of being poor or sick or homeless. But the good news is that there are many faith-based organizations that are willing to help these people. Our church, though small, does what it can to help people. We may feel compelled to pat ourselves on the back for it, but it is what we are called to do.

That part of our worship, which we call the offertory. reminds us of this calling, not just by giving money to this church, but in all of our efforts to improve the society in which we live. And small does not mean ineffective. The intimacy of one small gift, such as a lunch for one day, can have a far-reaching effect.

Sanctuary Repairs



For several years there have been problems with leaks in the Sanctuary area. On Monday, November 21st, work began to remove the old paint peeling from the walls, columns and support beams.

Of course, "things happen" and that day was no exception. Some hidden damage was found in some of the metal support columns and the concrete support beams.

To the rescue came Mr. Jorge Rangel who began moving pews (by himself!) and the ladder to start scrapping off the old paint. Several days later, he began to plaster over the rough spots on the walls where the damages were.

Work in the Sanctuary had not yet been completed by the time the *Banner* went to press. More about the Sanctuary repairs and the extra costs in the next issue of the *Banner*.


